led to expanding my knowledge of the workings of our Branches.

We have just finished the 2014 Annual SIRinc Corporation meeting on August 4th. I enjoyed being able to meet so many Big Sirs from around the state, as I cannot get to all the Branches this year. I am truly pleased to see the selection of very experienced, dedicated Sirs elected by the membership. I know the State Board will continue striving to improve our organization by using all of our new members; our standing committees, who work hard developing activities to enrich and excite members and potential members, and the dedicated Regional Directors, who are in contact with their respective Branches.

When I started out the year, I put forth to the State Board the need to stress improved communication between the Branches, through the Area Governors and Regional Directors, and in addition, there needs to be more emphasis on co-ed activities. The special Board meeting provided our Regional Directors with numerous activities that could be presented to the AG's and their respective Branches. I have been pleased with the reports which indicated improved direction by those Branches that were experiencing slow progress.

There are still Branches that need the improvement of increased membership, and while the State Board has the SAT committee that can provide excellent help for those that are in need, those in need have not been motivated to ask for help.

Growth & Membership Committee Jerry Milano, Chairman

Since the name of the committee properly identifies WHAT Growth and Membership does, the purpose of this article is to describe HOW G&M tries to accomplish its mission. There are five principal activities of the committee: Publicity, Training, Emergency Branch Assistance, Branch Research and Special Projects. The first three are accomplished by subcommittees of G&M.



Publicity is handled by the Advertising and Publicity Subcommittee chaired by Walter Schick. The subcommittee also staffs the SIR Inc. hotline 1-877-747-9066 and email inquiries about Sons In Retirement to our corporate website: sirinc.org.

The Training Subcommittee is chaired by Derek Southern. Since the Big Sir in each Branch changes every year and the Area Governors and Regional Directors also change very frequently, training the volunteer leadership on their responsibilities to the organization is an ongoing activity. In an attempt to improve the quality of the Big Sir training, the subcommittee has decided to break it into three multi-regional sections. This change should allow more interaction and reduce the travel for the participants. The training for AGs and RDs will be separated from the Big Sir training (day and location) to permit the trainers to focus their message for each audience.

Emergency Branch Assistance is the bailiwick of the Survivability Action Team (SAT) headed by Dick DeVoe. When a Branch has trouble recruiting leadership for succession or continuous membership loss that threatens the viability of the Branch, SAT is available to assist the Branch Executive Committee with diagnosis and potential cures for the problems at hand.

Branch Research is the responsibility of the entire Growth & Membership Committee which consists of the three subcommittee chairs; Bobbie Hairston, the SIR Inc.

Three Time Olympian



Most of his fellow Branch 161 members know that Sir Jack Disney excels in golf and bowling. But few knew that, in his younger years, he was a bicycle racer and a speed ice skater. The two pictures show Jack in his younger years and now.

Jack began his bicycle racing career in 1953 and won his first five consecutive National Amateur Championships in 1954. Jack won the

National Senior Sprint Championships in 1966 and again in 1968, and was the Silver Medalist at the National Senior Sprint Championships in 1973. He was a member of the US Olympic Team in 1956, 1964 and 1968. He also won a Silver Medal in the 1959 Pan Am Games. In recognition of these accomplishments, Jack was inducted into the United States Bicycling Hall of Fame in 1988.

Proving his athletic versatility, Jack also made two Olympic squads in speed skating, making him both an Olympian and a Hall of Famer!



We watched demonstrations of how these highly trained dogs attack a threatening subject and we were told how the dogs are trained to find explosives.

Other stops included a WW2 period German POW solitary confinement prison, a static display of some historic military aircraft which included the SR-71, the fastest military aircraft (see picture) and the D-21 unmanned aerial reconnaissance vehicle.

We were shown how U2 pilots function in their \$250,000 flying suites. We also learned everything from how they relieve themselves at 60,000 feet to how they eat from what looks like a tooth paste tube and a straw.

The high point of the day was our last stop which was on the tarmac where we got to be up close and personal with a group of military training jets. While we were there, we watched U2's take off and land, watched the stunning F-22 Raptors take off and shoot straight up into the sky and we saw, from a distance, some RQ4 Global Hawks on the ground. It was one of the best Lunch & Explore Group outings we've done so far.

Committee Reports

Branch Closings—Taking the Easy Way Out

The Nominating slate of new Branch Officers for the coming year is one of the most important responsibilities of a Branch's leadership. Yet every year, during July and August, there are Branches that have not completed this important task and therefore, put their Branches at great risk of closure within a few months.

Last year, the Survivability Action Team (SAT) worked with the BEC's of several Branches to help save them from closing. Before that, many Branches closed over the years because their Branch leadership took the "easy way out" by closing, rather than taking the necessary – and admittedly sometimes difficult task – of filling their officer positions prior to the New Year.



Whenever a Branch closes – for whatever reason – the BEC leaders are always the ones directly responsible because they didn't do what they should have done to keep the Branch viable. The SIR Manual is very clear- "The Branch Executive Committee shall direct the exercise of all corporate powers of the Branch and the conduct of all its activities and affairs." The Branch officers can blame the Nominating Committee, and even the members themselves, for not completing the officer slate but the bottom line is, the BEC is charged with the ultimate responsibility.

And who suffers when a Branch closes? The members themselves – of course – all of whom had the reasonable expectation that its Branch leaders would do whatever was necessary for the Branch to exist long term. It should be pointed out that these closures aren't just Branches with 50 or less members. There are Branches with well over 100 members at serious risk of failure because the leaders have let their members down.

In mid-July as this article is being written, there are Branches, **once again**, that have placed themselves in serious risk by failing to complete their Nominating Slates. Yet the SIR Schedule of Branch Operations in the SIR Leaders Guide allows over 9 months for every Branch to complete the slate selection process.

If your Branch currently does not have key positions selected in its slate of officers for the coming year, the SAT is available to assist in fulfilling that leadership responsibility. Please feel free to contact me, Dick DeVoe, at 925-932-5546 or dicknchristy@comcast.net.

Vice President; Jerry Strain, the Region 8 Director and Jerry Milano, the Committee Chair. Three contributing members resigned from the committee this year. The principal committee research supports the Ten-Seventy Branch Goals Program introduced by former SIR President, Jim Stedman in 2010. The program tracks data on membership and Branch Luncheon attendance for the 134 SIR Branches throughout Northern California. Research is based on a theory that a Branch recruiting ten percent or more new members each year AND maintaining regular monthly luncheon attendance of at least seventy percent of its current membership will, over time, establish a solid core of members who will nurture and sustain the Branch. Others have suggested that Branches need to recruit at least as many members as they lost the prior year and that member activities are at least as important as popular luncheons to maintaining healthy Branches.

Finally, G&M is required to handle stand-by assignments from the SIR Board of Directors. Last year G&M took on the responsibility of organizing a special training class for the Area Governors and Regional Directors after the Training Committee advised that it was under resourced to train all the Big Sirs and the RDs and AGs. The resulting training class led to the restructuring of the committees this year so that Training became a subcommittee of Growth & Membership. This year the Board asked G&M to organize a day-long strategic planning meeting in March. That special meeting resulted in President Maynard Rodland requiring Regional Director special goal setting and reporting on progress at each subsequent SIR Board Meeting.

I hope this short article is helpful to the membership in understanding how the Growth & membership committee attempts to fulfill its mandate to grow the SIR organization and its membership so that more men can enjoy a healthy and active retirement by making new friends and enjoying the fellowship.


